District Update

Projects enhance learning, operations

The Board and Administration of Franklin City Schools have been working on projects and initiatives to improve facilities, enhance educational opportunities, and increase the integration of technology in the classroom and district operations.

Dr. Mike Sander, Superintendent of Schools, recently provided highlights of these projects.

Workforce Development Initiative: On one hand, Warren County employers are seeking a steady supply of qualified employees who are ready to work and possess the soft skills needed for success. On the other hand, high school

"Students may see a business but have no idea what goes on inside so have no idea what opportunities are available." students planning to enter the workforce immediately after graduation may not be aware of the employment options available in our area. Sander noted, "Students may see a business but have no idea what goes on inside so have no idea what opportunities are available."

This fall, Franklin City Schools will participate in a pilot program with curriculum designed to bridge that gap. A partnership with area employers, school districts, United Way of Warren County, LifeSpan, and others will target high-potential students who don't plan to attend college or technical school and those who will attend local colleges and tech schools but who need to enter the workforce immediately.

Students will take courses in financial literacy, interview skills, and resume writing. They'll tour area employers and learn about "soft" skills. In the second semester of their junior year, students will have the opportunity for a paid internship for high school credit. Senior year, the internship will be both semesters. The goal is to create job-ready students who have a job upon graduation.

Buildings and Grounds: The board recently adopted a 10-year plan to replace classroom building roofs. Analysis by Robert Ehmet Hayes & Associates, PLCC, Architects provided a thorough overview of the state of district roofs.

Most critical is Schenck, where a flat roof allows water to

The board recently adopted a 10-year plan to replace classroom building roofs, for a total cost of \$4.6 million pool after rain. Test cuts indicated that all three layers of roof were wet, and the architect recommended a complete teardown to the deck, to be replaced with a new, sloped roof warranted for 20 years.

The Schenck project will be bid

this winter when prices will be lower. Next year, the district plans to pave and seal parking lots, and build a single bay bus garage to allow technicians to work inside.

In out years, roofing would be done at the junior high, then the high school and part of Pennyroyal. Those will be followed by Anthony Wayne, Hampton Bennett, Hunter and Gerke, and then remaining parts of the high school. The entire 10-year project is estimated at \$4.6 million and will be paid for with permanent improvement funds, not general fund monies.

An LED lighting retrofit was completed for all the buildings in 2016-17, which is saving the district \$2,400/month in energy costs. The project was done at no cost because Duke Energy and the state of Ohio rebated the expenses.

Recent security updates included adding internal and external security cameras to Pennyroyal, and cameras, alarms, and more lighting at the stadium.

Alarms were added to refrigerators and freezers which will alert to open doors and temperature problems.

Air quality at the high school has been addressed with changes to HVAC. Classrooms will now have two thermostats, one for temperature and one for CO2. Changes in the air handling will more equalize the inflow and out flow of air. When the high school was built, a "tighter" building was considered desirable but is no longer.

The district will also be moving to a new type of window air conditioner that can serve 6 classrooms at once and use just 25% of the electricity used by a traditional window AC unit.

College Credit Plus: When the levy passed in 2014, one promise was to increase dual enrollment options for high school students, allowing them to take high school courses for college credit. Today, dual enrollment and PSEO have been replaced by College Credit Plus, an Ohio Department of Education program that allows students to earn both high school and college credit for courses taken. Students may take courses at their local high school or on college campuses depending on course availability. Sander noted that when he was hired, the district offered two dual enrollment courses. That's grown to 16.

FHS principal Jim McFarland said students have responded positively to the CCP option and that for this year, 130+ students are signed up to take at least one CCP course at FHS; many will take multiple courses. Many students enjoy the benefit of taking courses for college credit without having to leave the high school during the school day. Some students do take courses off campus, but this *Continued on page 4*

Clinton says, "My outstanding teachers at Hunter Elementary, Hampton Bennett Middle School, and dear old Franklin High laid a strong foundation for a career that has been a lot of fun! Senior citizens (age 62+) living in the Franklin City School district may pick up a pass in the Superintendent's office that will allow them to attend school-sponsored activities, including sporting events and arts performances, at no charge.

Enrolling your child in school

You may enroll your child in school at the Franklin City Schools Welcome Center Registration Office, 150 E. Sixth St., in the Hampton Bennett Building. Hours are Monday through Friday, 8 a.m. to 3:30 p.m.

For your convenience, and to minimize waiting time, a parent/guardian must contact the Welcome Center Office to schedule an appointment to complete the registration process in person.

In addition to your completed registration packet, the following documents must be provided for enrollment in the Franklin City School District:

- Original Birth Certificate
- Custody Papers/Court Ordered Placement (if applicable) (Divorce Decree, date stamped and signed by judge/ magistrate). Note: If you are in the process of acquiring custody, you must have documentation from court confirming legal proceedings have been initiated. There is a 60-day legal completion process for the student to continue enrollment at Franklin City Schools.
- Shot/Immunization Records
- Parent/Guardian Driver's License
- Proof of Residency (Rental/Lease agreement, Settlement Statement, Land/ Purchase Contract, Copy of Deed, Electric or Water Bill. Items listed are the only items that will be accepted.
- IEP/504/MFE (if applicable)
- Transcript from previous school attended (Grades 9-12 only)
- Social Security Card

When all documents have been verified you will be directed to contact your child's assigned school building to complete the enrollment process for orientation, scheduling, and transportation. You may also be required to complete additional building forms.

We want to make your child's first day a positive experience, therefore, we need time to prepare for him/her to join our classes. Due to scheduling and transportation, students enrolled may start the day after registration requirements have been met.

If your child has any medical issues that need to be addressed, please contact the building nurse prior to the start of school.

option allows those that don't want to leave the same benefits. He noted that parents also have embraced the program. "For many parents, there is a clear financial benefit for students taking these classes," said McFarland.

Sander said that since its inception, "176 students have taken 1,008 classes and saved \$95,488, not including the cost of books." He added that 78% of our students earn an A or B. A further goal for the program is to have a mix of course offerings that will let students graduate with both a high school diploma and an associate's degree.

Curriculum: Sander said 2016-17 was the first year the district used its new math and English Language Arts curriculum. In 2017-18, new curriculum will be implemented for science and foreign languages and a new social studies curriculum will be piloted. He added that more and more materials are online, which saves money.

Pre-school: The district's pre-school is up for evaluation this fall. The goal is to obtain a 5-star rating from the state (the highest).

Technology: Another levy promise was to increase technology in the classroom. This year, the district will continue its

Parents will also be able to log into an app and see the location of their child's bus in real time. one-to-one initiative with every 7th, 8th, and 9th grade student having their own Chromebook. Seventh and ninth graders will receive new machines; 8th graders will keep their 7th grade computer. Next year, the district will be one-to-one for students in grades 10, 9, 8, and 7. As new machines are cycled in, older ones will be cycled down to the elementary

buildings.

New technology for the transportation department will make info about bus schedules more easily accessible. GPS has been added to all of the busses, and with an upgrade in the transportation software, students and families will have access to real time information about their bus routes. An app will allow parents to login to see the location of their child's bus. Parents can time when to send kids to the bus stop on inclement weather days, and to know if their child has been dropped off in the afternoon.

Community Eligibility Provision: This fall, Anthony Wayne, Gerke, Pennyroyal, and Schenck will all offer free breakfast and lunch to all students. Additional information will be available when school begins.
